Moving Forward Together! Women Educating & Inspiring Generations

In 2025, the National Women's History Alliance (NWHA) proudly presents the theme "Moving Forward Together! Women Educating & Inspiring Generations." This theme celebrates the collective strength, equality, and influence of women who have dedicated their lives to education, mentorship, and leadership, shaping the minds and futures of all generations.

Importance and Relevance

Education has always been a powerful catalyst for change, and women have been at the forefront, driving this transformation. From classrooms to boardrooms, and from grassroots movements to global initiatives, women educators and leaders have played a pivotal role in nurturing minds and inspiring action. This theme underscores the importance of acknowledging and celebrating these contributions, especially at a time when inclusive and equitable education is more critical than ever.



Goals and Objectives

Honor: Recognize the achievements and contributions of women educators, mentors, and leaders.

Inspire: Motivate all generations to pursue education and leadership roles, and to work for equality and diversity.

SHARING WOMEN'S HISTORY IN CLASSROOMS

Women's history is a vital component of our shared human narrative, yet it is often overlooked or marginalized in traditional educational settings. Teachers face the constant challenge of covering an incredible amount of material in multiple subjects, often running out of time. This creates opportunities for parent volunteers or volunteer organizations to provide additional information about influential women in history. Here's how to make it effective:

Understanding the Current Curriculum

Assess Textbooks: Many textbooks are outdated but too expensive to replace. Understand what the children are reading in class to tailor supplementary information effectively.

Educators Might Consider:

- **Biography Projects:** Assign students to research and present the life of a notable woman in history, highlighting achievements, challenges faced, and societal impact.
- **Research Projects:** Allow students to delve into specific aspects of women's history, building research skills and becoming topic experts.
- **Artistic Expressions:** Encourage students to express their understanding of women's history through writing, poetry, art, and music. Host exhibitions or performances to showcase their work.
- **Historical Timelines:** Suggest groups work together to create a timeline of women's history.
- **Inclusive Lessons:** Ensure women's perspectives are included across all subjects, not just history. Discuss literature by women, explore scientific contributions, and highlight achievements in mathematics.
- **Student-Led Assemblies:** Provide opportunities for students to organize and lead assemblies or events celebrating women's history, empowering them to take ownership of their learning.

Consider the Outside World

- **Current Events:** Connect historical events with current issues to emphasize the ongoing relevance of women's history. Discuss news articles or documentaries related to gender equality.
- **Media Analysis Projects:** Have students analyze advertisements they see on television, online, or in magazines over a set period to understand gender representation.

By incorporating these strategies, educators, parents, and volunteers can ensure that women's history is not just an add-on but a fully integrated and valued part of the educational experience.

Parents and/or Other Organizations Might Offer Assistance

If teachers are open to receiving additional information from parents or outside organizations, consider the following:

- **Reading Materials:** Suggest books and articles highlighting the achievements of women from various backgrounds, ethnicities, and time periods.
- **Guest Speakers:** Invite guest speakers and role models to talk about their work. This provides real-life examples of women breaking barriers and excelling in various fields.
- **Virtual Visits:** Utilize virtual visits to broaden the range of women who can speak to the students.

Planning a Women's History Month Outside the Classroom

Volunteers or educators can sponsor a Women's History Month event in March, culminating in a History Evening or History Saturday to share the experience with families and the community. Depending on the students' ages, consider these ideas:

- **Poster Display:** Have students create posters or dress up as historical figures, setting up "stations" where parents and other audience members can interact with them.
- **Debates:** Organize debates on women's rights, such as discussing why women did not get the vote until 1920.
- **Plays:** Stage a play about women's history, with students choosing the time period and creating the script. Utilize local re-enactor groups for additional support.

Did you know?

Babe Didrikson Zaharias was a remarkable American athlete who excelled in track and field, basketball, and golf. Born on June 26, 1911, in Port Arthur, Texas, she gained fame in the 1932 Olympics, winning two gold medals and one silver. She later turned to golf, becoming a founding member of the Ladies Professional Golf Association (LPGA) and winning 10 major championships. Known for her fierce competitiveness and exceptional talent, Zaharias was a trailblazer for women in sports, inspiring athletes worldwide.



Parents and/or Other Organizations Might Offer Assistance

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Organize a Book Club


Create a women's history book club where students read age-appropriate books or articles about influential women. Discussions can center on the challenges these women faced and how they overcame them.

Community Partnerships and Resources

- **Local Collaborations:** Partner with local women's organizations and community groups to create events or workshops centered around women's history, fostering community engagement.
- **Field Trips:** Organize visits to local museums, historical sites, and landmarks that highlight women's contributions.
- **Public Libraries:** Utilize oral histories, diaries, letters, and photographs available at public libraries and historical societies.
- Career Panels: Organize career panels with women from diverse professions to expose students to a wide range of career possibilities and reinforce that they can succeed in any field.

Involving Families and the Community

- **Interviews:** Encourage students to interview women in their community, such as family members, teachers, neighbors, or local professionals, to learn about their experiences.
- Family Histories: Collect family recipes and artifacts, noting their historical significance. This can be an enlightening project for students.
- **Exploration:** Have students explore family basements for old items like kitchen tools, irons, radios, or TVs. Students can photograph these items and report back on their findings.

- **Documentaries and Films:** Host screenings of documentaries or films followed by discussions to deepen students' understanding and critical thinking skills.
- Podcasts and Webinars: Explore podcasts and webinars focused on women's history. Create listening or viewing guides to facilitate discussions and reflections, encouraging students to analyze and share their thoughts.
